

## 2025 NFL Draft: RB Prospect Profiles:

The 2025 NFL Draft running back class is a deep, dynamic group that blends bruising powerhouses with electrifying playmakers, offering a versatile array of talent for modern offenses. Headlined by Boise State's Ashton Jeanty, a Heisman runner-up with 2,497 yards and 29 TDs in 2024, the class boasts elite prospects like Iowa's Kaleb Johnson and Ohio State's Quinshon Judkins, who marry size and speed with proven production. Depth shines with breakout stars like SMU's Brashard Smith and Tennessee's Dylan Sampson, bringing speed and receiving flair, while workhorses like Kansas' Devin Neal and Texas Tech's Tahj Brooks anchor the group with durability and grit. From FCS risers like Delaware's Marcus Yarns to late converts like Michigan's Kalel Mullings, this class spans a spectrum of styles—power, elusiveness, and three-down versatility—promising immediate contributors and developmental gems for Day 1 and beyond.

At 5'9", 215 lbs, he's a compact dynamo—163 missed tackles forced showcase unreal elusiveness, while eight 50+ yard runs prove his burst (4.40–4.45 40). His 217-yard, 3-TD game at Hawaii underlines his dominance. Pass pro needs work, and 720 college carries spark durability debates, but his vision and finishing power scream elite RB1. He's a spread/zone dream—think McCaffrey with less polish but equal dynamism.

### Draft Projection

**Mid-to-Late First Round (Picks 10–25):** Top RB—teams will jump for a rare three-down star, likely top-20.

### Best Team Fits

1. **Dallas Cowboys:** Cowboys address RB finally after ignoring it in 2024, despite Rico Dowdle playing well.
2. **New Orleans Saints:** Alvin Kamara's clock is ticking and the Saints need their future workhorse.
3. **Las Vegas Raiders:** Perhaps the clear worst RB group in the league, Jeanty would be a slam dunk.

### Final Thoughts

Jeanty's rare blend of production and explosiveness makes him a top-15 lock—durability the only question.

At 6’0”, 220 lbs, he’s a bulldozer—73 missed tackles forced and 1,026 yards after contact showcase his tackle-breaking grit, while his 206-yard, 3-TD outburst vs. Wake Forest underlines his dominance. His burst (4.45–4.50 40) adds chunk-play potential, and his pass-blocking willingness hints at three-down upside. Agility and long speed cap his big-play ceiling, and 522 carries over two years raise wear concerns, but his power and vision fit gap/power schemes as a Day 1 RB1. He’s a top-5 RB with a high floor and star potential.

### **Draft Projection**

**Late First to Early Second Round (Picks 25–40):** Top-5 RB—teams craving a workhorse will pounce late Round 1 or early Day 2.

### **Best Team Fits**

1. **Kansas City Chiefs:** Elevates Pacheco with a power complement for Mahomes’ attack.
2. **Cleveland Browns:** Replaces aging Chubb with a physical RB1.
3. **Denver Broncos:** Boosts Sean Payton’s run game with a durable hammer.

### **Final Thoughts**

Hampton’s blend of power, production, and versatility positions him as a Day 1 starter—durability and speed are the only hurdles to elite status.

At 5'10", 205 lbs, he's a speed demon (4.35–4.40 40)—58 missed tackles and three 50+ yard TDs in 2024 showcase his juice, while his 151-yard, 2-TD game vs. Iowa proves his big-play chops. Injuries (10 games missed) and a lean

frame limit his power, but his burst, vision, and 73 career receptions fit spread/zone schemes as an RB2 with RB1 upside. Pass pro needs refinement—his ceiling hinges on staying healthy, making him a Day 2 gamble with All-Pro potential.

**Late First to Early Second Round (Picks 25–40):** Top-5 RB—teams betting on his speed and upside will jump late Round 1 or early Day 2.

### **Best Team Fits**

1. **Miami Dolphins:** Pairs with De’Von Achane for a blazing duo in McDaniel’s scheme. Dolphins released Raheem Mostert and could be looking for that next duo.
2. **Los Angeles Chargers:** Complements JK Dobbins with speed and receiving flair.
3. **Kansas City Chiefs:** Adds a home-run threat behind Pacheco for Mahomes.

Built for power/gap schemes, he’s a Day 1 RB1 with a high floor—his massive workload (750 carries) is the main question mark, though his durability holds up so far.

**Mid-to-Late First Round (Picks 15–32):** Top-3 RB—teams needing a rugged RB1 will jump late Round 1, drawn by his production and physicality.

## Best Team Fits

1. **Cleveland Browns:** Replaces aging Nick Chubb with a similar power back to anchor the run game.
2. **Las Vegas Raiders:** Strong RB1 option right away.
3. **Washington Commanders:** Boosts Jayden Daniels with a reliable lead RB to control the clock.

His burst (4.45–4.50 40) and 22 catches add versatility, though pass protection and agility remain works in progress. Built for zone schemes, he's a Day 1 starter with a high floor—his 240-carry season raises slight wear concerns, but his physicality and finishing power suggest a feature-back future.

**Late First to Early Second Round (Picks 20–40):** Top-3 RB—teams seeking a feature back with power and speed will target him late Round 1 or early Day 2.

### Best Team Fits

1. **New York Giants:** Pairs with Tyrone Tracy as a power-speed threat for Daboll's offense.
2. **Miami Dolphins:** Complements De'Von Achane's speed with a bruising counterpart in McDaniel's system.
